Fire Safety During The Colder Months

This is the prime time of year that indoor fires are likely to occur and we ask you to make sure everyone in the household is aware of the possible fire dangers around them. Please read the below cautions to help prevent fire in your apartment:

USE CANDLES SAFELY—always blow out candles when leaving a room, don't burn close to anything flammable and trim the wicks to 1/4" before burning.

DON'T OVERLOAD ELECTRICAL OUTLETS—this can cause a short that can create a fire. Also, beware of worn, chewed or frayed electrical cords.

PORTABLE HEATERS NEED SPACE—make sure any portable heater being used has at least 3 feet of space from any wall, furniture or objects.

EXERCISE CAUTION IN THE KITCHEN—keep stovetops clear of spills, built-up grease, or items such as pot holders or dish towels that may easily catch fire.

USE APPLIANCES SAFELY—always keep small appliances such as hair dryers or irons unplugged when not in use. Never plug more than one heat producing appliance (i.e. coffee pot and toaster) in the same outlet.

Freezing Weather

A few recommended precautions for extreme cold weather:



- To prevent pipes from freezing, we recommend leaving your thermostat at 55 degrees.
- Leave both hot and cold water running in a steady stream.
- Open all cupboards that are under a sink so the pipes get some heat from the rest of the apartment.
- Please notify the office if you will be away from your apartment for more than a few days.
- Let the office know immediately if your pipes freeze.

Holiday Decorating Safety

If you decorate your home for the upcoming holidays please be aware of safety issues to avoid fire hazards

Holiday Tree:

- When choosing tree needles should be green and hard to pull back from branches. Dry needles fall off tree easily can be a fire hazard.
- Remember to water your tree regularly to keep it from drying out.
- Do not place your tree close to a heat source.

Holiday Lights:

- Inspect lights for frayed wires, bare spots, broken or cracked sockets, and excessive kinking or wear before putting them up.
- Do not link more than 3 strands of lights together.
- Make sure to periodically check the wires—they should not be warm to the touch.
- Check out LED light options—they are longer lasting, brighter and don't warm up.
- Do not leave holiday lights on unattended.

Holiday Decorations:

 All decorations should be nonflammable or flame-retardant and placed away from heat sources.

On-Site Trash Services

We wanted to remind everybody about proper use of on-site trash services. Following these guidelines will help ensure that trash disposal services are properly arranged for the community.

- Residents should dispose of all garbage, debris and recycling materials in the designated dumpster or recycling receptacle
- The dumpster is only to be used for ordinary residential trash and debris from households residing at the community
- Flammable or toxic materials, furniture, household appliances, batteries and other nonresidential trash not permitted in the dumpster area
- All trash must fit inside of the dumpster receptacle with the lid closed
